Type of placement	Ansty Ward is a 30 bedded inpatient ward specialising in urology emergencies and elective urology and digestive disease surgery. We care for day surgery patients along with inpatients and is a Surgical Unit for patients undergoing a range of surgical procedures and medical interventions. Students are allocated a practice supervisor and practice assessor; however, they will work with other trained members of the nursing team when their mentors are on days off, study leave or annual leave.
