Type of placement	An interesting and dynamic medical ward specializing in treating adult patients with neurological conditions. The ward has 15 beds in 3 bays. In addition, there is a video telemetry room (for seizure assessments) and a planned investigation unit (PIU). A strong MDT focus supports diagnosis of conditions such as Creutzfeldt Jacob Disease (CJD) and complex discharge plans for patients with Motor Neurone Disease for example
